### Welcome the Outdoor Education, PE and Sport Service...

Hampshire's Outdoor Education Service has recently evolved to become the **Outdoor Education, PE and Sport Service**. This new title reflects the role of the service in covering the related activities within it, offering new and exciting opportunities for working with colleagues across the service, including the Duke of Edinburgh's Award in Hampshire. Our web address remains the same - [www.hants.gov.uk/education/outdoor](http://www.hants.gov.uk/education/outdoor), with links from there to the different and new aspects of the Service. From the Outdoor Education side of things there are a couple of new developments to bring to your attention.

#### Training courses on-line

Training information is still available on our website. However you can now book most of the courses offered through the Outdoor Education Service on-line via the Learning Zone. In the same way you would book courses through **HTLC** and other providers, you can access Outdoor Leader Training (**Open Country**) and a variety of other courses using the online system. This makes it a quicker and easier process to find a course, book a place and organise payment. For details of courses currently available visit:

#### Hampshireoutdoors.com

The Outdoor Education, PE and Sport Service will be introducing a web-based system for planning, organising and approving Educational Visits by secondary schools and youth groups in

the very near future. Each school, youth group and DofE group will be sent their log in details once their establishment is 'live'.

We are using a system called **EVOLVE** - a fully managed online service specifically designed to enable the efficient processing of educational visit proposals. EVOLVE is now being used by 43 local authorities and is intended to help EVCs plan and organise all aspects of educational visits, as well as speeding up the approval system.

pupil records. Upload pupil details from school information management systems (e.g. SIMS), track pupil visits attended, and download pupil reports in a format compatible with the national Children and Young Person Information Sharing Index.

- Powerful search and sort facilities to assist monitoring procedures.

- Clear audit trail.
- Comprehensive visit and provider evaluation tools.
- More than a database - a one-stop shop for Educational Visit planning, monitoring and evaluating.

## The real power of Trailblazer described by OfSTED ...

Following the late 2008 OfSTED inspection of **Catherington Infant School**, it was really heartening to read the subsequent inspectors report published in 2009, which praised the school all round, with comments such as **"the curriculum is innovative and extremely well planned to make links between subjects that excite and motivate pupils, leading to high levels of engagement and enjoyment in lessons"**.

However, for those of us who espouse the power and importance of **Learning Outside the Classroom**, the really pivotal points of the report related to the inspectors view of LOTC within Catherington ...

**"The recently introduced 'trailblazer' initiative is leading to creative use of the outdoor environment, although this is still at an early stage of implementation. For example, pupils in year 1 loved exploring different parts of the school field and garden to decide on suitable homes for small creatures. Teachers and teaching assistants steered them superbly through mature reasoning for their answers and pupils were excited about recording their findings in different ways. The school offers an extensive range of clubs, visits, visitors to the school and themed days to enrich the curriculum further"**.

In their letter to the pupils after the inspection the Inspectors went on to say **"You all told us how much you love being in school and learning new things. You especially enjoy using the field to learn outside the classroom through the new 'trailblazer' activities. Both your teachers and inspectors think you could use the outdoors even more in the future. We think that you all behave really well and take great care of each other, especially when you are a 'buddy'. The school gives you many opportunities to take responsibility and to work together. This is helping you to become confident and independent"**.

Following the highly positive 2008 OfSTED special report into LOTC nationally, this a real endorsement of outdoor learning and Trailblazer in particular. **Well done** to all the staff and pupils at Catherington, and long may your 'Trailblazing' continue ...

## Pass the toothbrush please ....

Was the refrain from a group of teachers who assembled at **Wallop Primary School** in July, to be met by a range of Museum and Outdoor staff led by **Chris Elmer** of the County Museum Service.

Thus began **"The Dig"** - a day of training which took teachers through a basic, professional, archaeological dig in all its stage - from setting out the trench site, to caring for and cataloguing the finds.

And finds there were aplenty - marble, glass, pottery and tile of varying ages, some quite old. However, whatever the age and nature of a 'find', there was genuine excitement generated by the process of emulating Time Team, and a real enthusiasm engendered by the experts on site.

The idea is that teachers can take back the skills they have learned into school and carry out their own school ground digs. There's plenty of history just below the surface, even in the most modern of school settings. But to take real advantage, and ensure you don't

inadvertently destroy some crucial real archaeology, it really does pay to learn how to do it properly - and it's great fun too.

The day was very successful, and Trailblazer is keen to develop courses and opportunities for the future - so watch this space.

### Wild summer at Tile Barn

Oh no, to experience real camping the children made hammocks in trees and slept in them with shelters over them. They played night games – not getting caught in the beam of the torch

The nature walk and bushcraft days proved to be extremely popular and the last session of the week was the grand finale. Everyone got to say their goodbyes and the instructors, now very familiar with everyone, presented certificates, giving their charges new names to suit their personalities. “Howler Monkey”, “Hydro entertainer”, “Big brother”, “Little Big Helper” to name but a few.



### Cowplain invasion of Tile Barn - with support from 847 Squadron ...

Each September, during the first full week of the autumn term, **Cowplain Community School** run a Year 7 camp at **Tile Barn**. This year, as for the past sixteen, almost the entire year group attended and spent three days in the late summer sunshine, making new friends, taking part in team building games and activities and enhancing their personal skills. The camp is a vital part of the children’s induction into the school and is the beginning of a four-year programme of outdoor activities which builds confidence, self-reliance and commitment in the students.



For nearly thirty years, the outdoor education programme at Cowplain has been headed up by **Keith Page** and this year, the Thursday of the camp - traditionally camp fire evening - just happened to coincide with his 60th birthday. The day began with the raising of a specially commissioned ‘pink’ birthday flag, followed by a visit from a Lynx helicopter of 847 Squadron, based at RNAS Yeovilton. The crew of the helicopter, Lieutenants Dave Thompson and Marc Cornford presented Keith with his birthday gift and then gave all the students, staff and helpers a guided tour of the Lynx!

The day continued with a birthday cake to feed 200, a balloon race and in the evening, a special camp fire which saw the surprise arrival of the 60KRP ‘patrol’ lead by members of the **Ramsey**

**Caledonia Pipe Band** from Netley. It is traditional for the children in their tutor group patrols to sing individual songs at camp fire and so it was appropriate that a group of forty or so of Keith’s family, friends and colleagues should be the last patrol to perform with a specially adapted version of ‘This Old Man’.

The organisers, **Sue Dobbyn** (Head of Music at Cowplain) and **Steve Prankard** (a parent helper) would like to thank everyone involved for their tremendous efforts on what proved to be a very special day. **Allstars** is a summer extension and reward scheme for the young people of Hampshire, who have attended a residential schools course at Calshot in the previous year. During their school course they have been selected by their teachers and instructors because they have shone as individuals. They have

demonstrated a positive attitude towards the staff and their peers, helping those who might be struggling, and really enjoying all aspects of the challenging activities and the outdoors.

### Week of challenge ...

Allstars is a week full of 'extras.' Our aim is to reward them and 'push' them to greater success by introducing them to new activities like snowboarding, and extending the horizons in other activities where there is already some experience.

We concentrated on the core skills of two main activities, kayaking and climbing which enabled us to take the group of 12 to the real locations. Our

first adventure was to paddle outrigger canoes to Ashlett Creek to practise our strokes before we canadian canoed down the River Beaulieu in the middle of a shower storm!! This left us wet and ready to get muddy as we swapped canoes for mountain bikes for the off road trail to Tile Barn.

ordinator for the Science Department and finally **Testbourne Community School**, Whitchurch for 3 Years as a Science Teacher and a Head of Year.

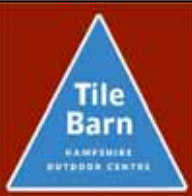

# Aiming High

**Aiming High 2009** came to a close at **Calshot** at the end of June, when the 40 young people from the four target groups (**Havant Locality Team (Warblington School), Hayling Island College, Winton School and Harrow Way School**) completed an extended weekend of activities at **Tile Barn, Beaulieu Development Centre and Calshot Activities Centre**. This brought an end to six months of intensive work that had seen the groups, formed in January, take part in a progressive programme across all the outdoor centres, including the **Mountain Centre** in Wales.

The pictures across these pages provide a flavour of what the young people undertook during their six month experience, and give an indication of the challenges they faced and the success they had.

Begun in 2005 with one pilot group, **Aiming High** was designed to work with young people in Year Seven who had been identified at risk of exclusion in their first year of secondary school. It took these youngsters and gave them a life changing experience that has seen the vast majority navigate their way to success in school, rather than falling by the wayside.

Managed by **Craig Lindsay**, Outdoor Development Worker at **Tile Barn** the programme has led to many off shoots, including short versions of the full Aiming High experience. 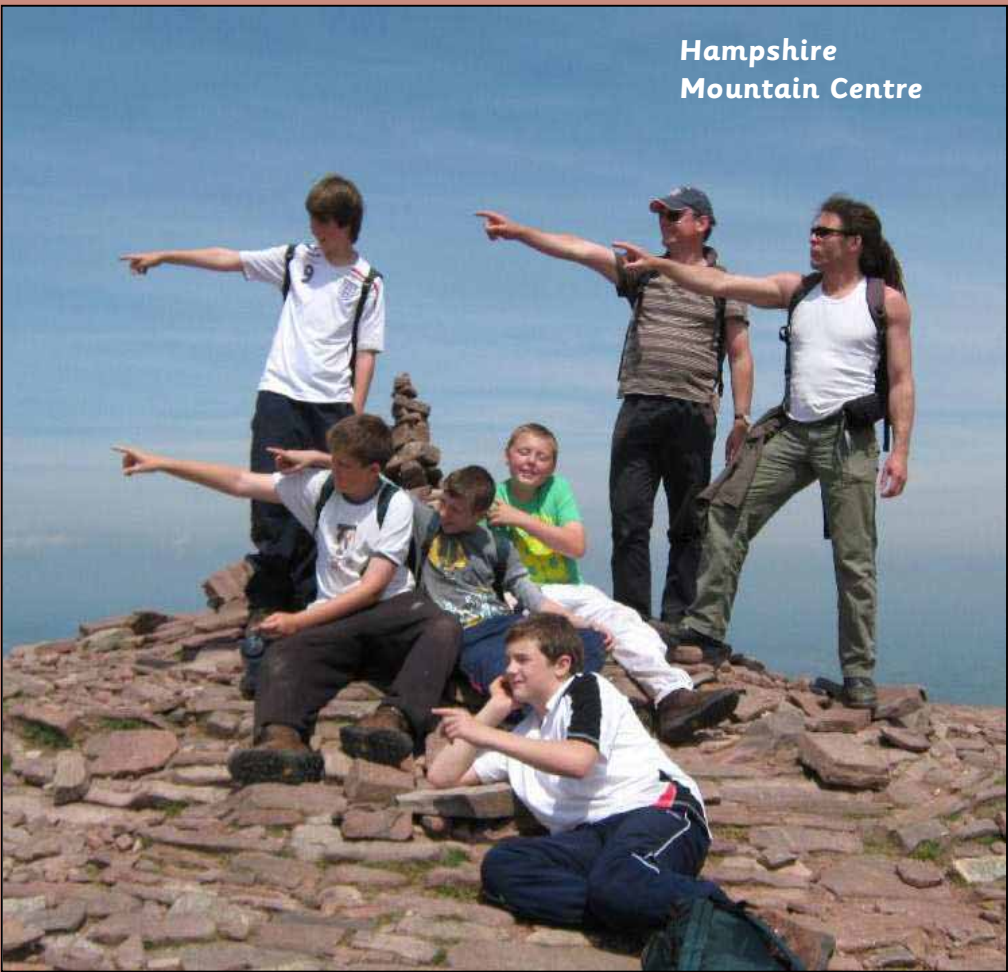

## Duke of Edinburgh's Award - the Next Generation



At the beginning of September the D of E in Hampshire became fully staffed after a long period of vacancies in some Districts. The new team are now in place and finding their way around their areas, getting to know the existing groups and centres and identifying gaps in provision, where there is scope for growth, and most importantly how the provision can be improved for young people!. We are also talking with leaders and volunteers about how their support needs can be met.

This is an exciting time for the DofE nationally as it seeks to extend the reach of DofE with young people through the introduction of e-DofE - an interactive on-line system that will help young people manage their DofE programme and progress.

There are many Government initiatives such as those around volunteering, helping young people into employment or training, and activities that make stronger links across generations. All of these are areas where DofE has a strong contribution to make, and all the time engaging young people in positive activities!

We are always looking to develop the DofE in Hampshire, but it is also important to reflect on the good work that has been achieved in the last year, with 2,731 new participants over the year and 1,772 adult volunteers.

## HAP excites young people in care ...

Over the last four months, an innovative and exciting Project was undertaken by Young People In Care – “HAP”. HAP stands for **Hampshire Adventure Project** and involved working with two District Youth Teams (**New Forest & Eastleigh**) in partnership with Children In Care Teams (CiC), Outdoor Education Unit, and funded by HCC **Culture, Communities & Rural Affairs Department** with support from the Care Matters grant. Due to the nature of both groups it was felt that Youth Workers possessed the range of group work skills and knowledge that were appropriate and together with their professionalism and experience it would enable the young people to derive the greatest benefit from the informal learning opportunities provided by the programme.

Each District Youth Team set out to identify 10 young people in care, aged 14 – 17yrs and involve them in a programme of **Outdoor Education & Personal Development** opportunities ranging from Horse Riding to Scuba Diving to Bushcraft to a residential on board a narrow boat.

The purpose of the Project was to:

- Increase participants self esteem and confidence
- Provide a range of accredited learning opportunities
- Develop a variety of social & life skills that would be of benefit in the future
- Encourage a greater understanding of the attributes required to live and work with others

Both groups undertook a range of group work experiences that resulted in some really positive outcomes, as well as

raising some issues for the future – as would be expected with any “group experience”.

### Partnership in action ...

Though the Youth Workers (**Mike Jones, Fran Hayes, Karen Pressey**) were of pivotal importance, working with other professional colleagues (Social Workers, Residential Unit workers and Children’s Services and CCRA) resulted in identifying the importance of inter agency working – a major factor to consider for anyone developing this type of programme.

During the programme young people achieved accreditation through **AQA** and **Duke of Edinburgh’s award** and also received District Youth Team “official” Project Participation Certificates.

Evaluation of the Project is still ongoing and discussions are in hand looking at



ways of developing the next stage of the Project.

## A successfully fishy summer ...

Following discussions with the Environment Agency (EA) an opportunity for young people to experience Coarse Fishing was made available during August.

A subsidy from the EA allowed a group of 10 young people from across Hampshire to participate in a 5 day Angling Course under the leadership of **Bob McMahon** of **Fun2Fish**. Bob is a National Federation of Anglers Level 2 Coach and has extensive experience of working with groups of young people. Besides receiving expert tuition and coaching during the 5 days – there was also the added bonus that on completion of the course the young people would be able to keep the equipment that they had used (rod, reel, fishing box etc) and be in receipt of a 12 month Licence – entitling the young people to fish legally! They also received official accreditation through AQA.

**During the course young people learnt:** A range of angling skills; Positive fish management and handling; Relevant aspects of the Country Code; Fish identification and feeding habits - not to mention patience, concentration, water safety awareness, acceptance of others (especially of those who caught a bigger fish than they did!).

Fishing can be seen as a sport that is pointless – why sit on a river or lake side for hours to catch a fish – only then to return it! Observing this group of young people actively engaged in an activity for 5 hours a day for 5 days continuously was interesting for the support staff to witness – food for thought when involved in formal learning!!



Feedback on completion of the course resulted in all the young people scoring 9 out of a possible 10 (10 being perfect). During the summer holidays Hampshire County Council's **Aiming High for Disabled Children** Team worked with **Calshot Activities Centre** to organise a variety of short break activities for disabled young people.

Travelling down slopes at speed, soaring to new heights, cycling round in tight circles and firing arrows to hit the target. That's what you'd have found the young people doing on their adventurous day at Calshot. The thrill seeking young people were welcomed by a fantastic team of instructors to a variety of adventurous pursuits.

**'The abseiling! That's awesome! I just do it. I'm not scared or anything. Nothing will happen, it's all pretty safe - so I just do it really,'** says Chris.

Jamie had been to Calshot before and it was so good last time he came back for more, **'First thing I'm doing climbing. And then I was nervous because I think I'm not going to do abseiling, but I just did it! And it was great and I was helping other people to hold on the rope'**

And I think the carers and staff had just as much fun as the young people. A great day had by all!

So, if you know someone who's keen to head to Calshot another time then Toby's advice for others who'd like to have a go is **'Just try it and have fun!'**

Imogen's advice was, 'We're normal kids really'. 'We're the same as others', added Toby.

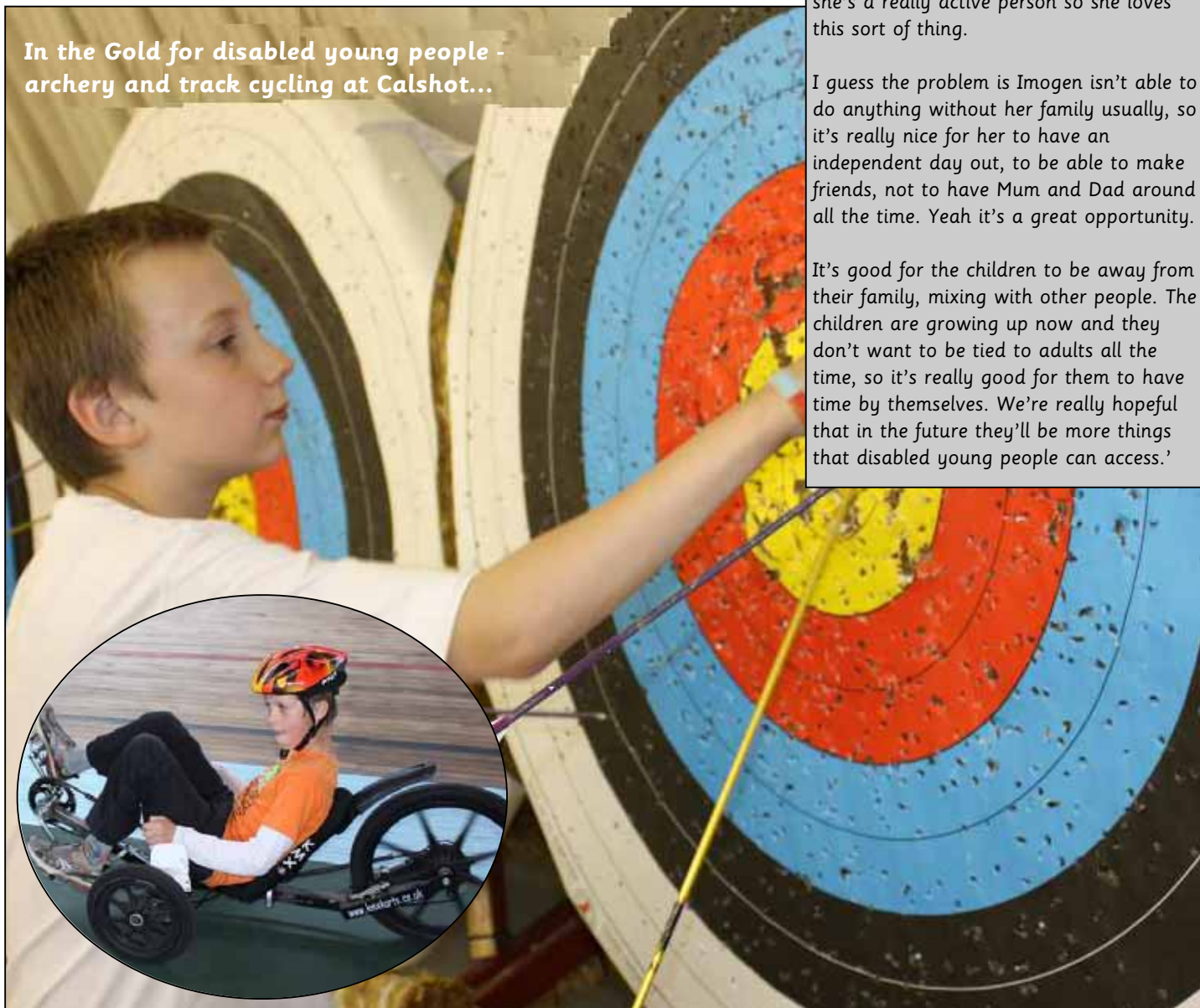
#### Imogen's Mum Jane commented

"Imogen is a wheelchair user and she walks around with crutches as well, so access is difficult to a lot of places and she's a really active person so she loves this sort of thing.

I guess the problem is Imogen isn't able to do anything without her family usually, so it's really nice for her to have an independent day out, to be able to make friends, not to have Mum and Dad around all the time. Yeah it's a great opportunity.

It's good for the children to be away from their family, mixing with other people. The children are growing up now and they don't want to be tied to adults all the time, so it's really good for them to have time by themselves. We're really hopeful that in the future they'll be more things that disabled young people can access.'
