Subject: **YOUTH PROVISION IN FAREHAM**

### **SUMMARY**

This report informs Members of the results of the Youth Scoping Report requested by the Scrutiny Board. The Panel is also given the opportunity to explore the options arising from the study's findings.

## **INTRODUCTION**

1. The Fareham Youth Mapping Report was commissioned by Fareham Borough Council through the Fareham Children and Young People's multi agency group (CYP). The report was produced following a scoping study report considered by the Scrutiny Board regarding opportunities for young people in the Borough of Fareham. A copy of the scoping study is contained appendix C.
2. Fareham and Gosport Connexions and HCC Fareham Youth Team agreed to complete the mapping project between January and March 2007. Officers from the organisations worked together to deliver the report.
3. The report provides a snapshot of the activities that young people take part in across the week during the period January - March 2007.
4. The activities have been divided into "organised" and "not organised" and further analysed by area.

## **RESEARCH WITH YOUNG PEOPLE**

5. The research was split into two methods to gain the findings; one section working with young people in school to complete a seven day diary of their leisure activities and two; desk top research into activities available to young people across Fareham.
6. Ten secondary schools across Fareham were approached to contribute to the study and seven participated. The seven schools were:
  - Henry Cort
  - Cams Hill
  - Neville Lovett
  - Crofton
  - Lord Wilson (special needs school)
  - St Francis (special needs school)
  - Baycroft (special needs school)
7. Pupils in years 7, 8, 9 and 10 (aged between 11 and 16 years old) took part in the classroom based sessions, this included young people with learning difficulties and behavioural difficulties. 219 young people participated in total.
8. The classroom sessions were delivered by a Youth Worker and Connexions Worker and explored the range of activities that young people participated in during the week. The young people produced a seven day diary of these activities. Appendix A of the report attached demonstrates one diary sheet.

9. The desk top research was carried out by a Youth Service Officer and the information was sourced from many different places including the Hampshire County Council websites *Hantsfish* and *Evolve*. This information has been added to a spreadsheet of activities organised by area. This can be found at appendix C of the accompanying report in appendix A.

## **RESEARCH RESULTS SUMMARY**

### **Activities recorded**

10. The results demonstrate that young people recorded up to 43% of their week as “staying in”. This time is spent playing on the computer, watching television, playing computer games. Some young people will also be helping out at home or completing homework. These were not noted by young people as leisure activities.
11. 57% of young people’s time across the week was recorded as “going out” and included sport as a popular leisure activity and then going out to socialise as a close second. Socialising included meeting in groups such as parks and taking part in unsupervised activities, could be round at someone else’s house.
12. The most popular “organised” activity was recorded as sport (football noted the most times), then cultural (drama and dance) and then uniformed activities (scouts and guides).
13. There appeared from the research to be no significant geographical differences across the schools’ responses.

### **Frequency of activities**

14. It was noted that as the young people got older they took part in less “organised” activities, preferring to find entertainment for themselves.
15. 85% of Year 7 young people took part in at least one “organised” activity per week. 26% of Year 7 young people took part in two “organised” activities per week.
16. The most frequent use of “organised” activities was twice a week by the age groups.

### **Young people with disabilities**

17. The CYP group was particularly interested to find out the views from young people with disabilities in this study.
18. The research demonstrates that the most popular activities for this group were; playing on video games, using MSN on the computer (social networking) and playing football.
19. The young people with disabilities did report feeling “excluded” from many organised activities for a number of reasons and felt that they had less

choice of activities.

### **Desk top research**

20. The data from the desk top research was grouped into 4 geographical areas around the secondary schools attended:
  - Locks Heath and Warsash
  - Sarisbury and Whiteley,
  - Fareham
  - Portchester.
21. The full list of activities compiled can be found at Appendix C of the accompanying report. This list includes information about the activity, the location and time, age group it is targeted at and a contact point.
22. The list demonstrates that a significant number of activities for young people are school based and cover a wide range of leisure opportunities including; cooking, music, sculpture, ballet, judo, roller hockey, beauty, art, tennis, golf, modern languages, guitar and steel band.
23. Other venues for young people's activities listed were:
  - Community centres
  - specialist sports centres (sailing, horse riding, tennis)
  - youth centres
  - recreation grounds
  - church halls
  - scout huts.

### **OPTIONS FOR DISCUSSION**

24. The purpose of the commissioned report was to establish the reality about young people and their leisure activities. This report has provided a snapshot of these activities.
25. Members are asked to consider the following options for discussion in order that this research may be used constructively.
  - that the information provided in the list of activities be posted on an appropriate website for greater access to information;
  - that this web address is widely advertised to draw young people/ agency workers/ parents/ schools to this information;

- that the information provided in the list of activities be printed off area by area for use by other agencies such as the Police;
- that the information provided in the list of activities be printed off as one whole directory of young people's leisure activities for Fareham and distributed using the community venues and schools;
- that the information gained about services for young people with disabilities and their aspirations be considered in the light of the CYP priorities and resources.

### **RISK ASSESSMENT**

26. The risk assessment summary is contained in appendix B.

### **CONCLUSION**

27. This report highlights for Members the results of the research completed with young people earlier this year.
28. The evidence demonstrates the wide range of activities currently on offer for young people across Fareham but also raises the issue of limited local provision for young people with disabilities.
29. Members are requested to consider the report and discuss the options for disseminating the information on opportunities for young people in the borough.

# What Do Young People in Fareham Do?



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## **2.3.1 Mapping Activities for Young People in Fareham**

### **1. Background**

This project, commissioned by Fareham Borough Council, aimed to find out what young people in Fareham do outside of school hours. South Central Connexions and Fareham District Youth Service undertook the research in Spring 2007.

### **2. Part 1: What Do Young People Do?**

#### **2.1 Summary**

- Averaged throughout the week more young people engaged in 'Going Out' activities rather than 'Staying In' – 57% to 43%
- 85% of 10/11 yr olds engage in an organised activity at least one night a week.
- As children grow older they choose to engage in less organised activities.
- Playing football was by far the most popular organised activity that young people engaged in.
- Young people from Special Needs schools felt more excluded and participated in more 'Staying In' activities than their peers.

#### **2.2 Methodology**

The project consisted of two strands:

- School based lessons to generate qualitative information from young people on exactly what they do.
- Research activities available to young people in Fareham

##### **2.2.1 School based research**

Seven out of the ten secondary schools in the Borough were visited by a Connexions worker and a Youth Worker to undertake this research:

- Henry Cort
- Cams Hill
- Neville Lovett
- Crofton
- Lord Wilson (Special Needs School for young people with emotional, behavioural difficulties)
- St Frances (Special Needs School for young people with severe learning difficulties)
- Baycroft (Special Needs School for young people with mild learning difficulties)

(The other three comprehensive schools were approached but it was not possible to gain access in the time available).

Although the original aim was to base the research on years 7 to 11 pupils, due to GCSE requirements very few year 11s (16 yr olds) took part. In total 219 young people gave feedback on their leisure activities by participating in a guided lesson about participation (see Appendix A for lesson plans). The sessions were delivered by a Connexions worker and a Youth Worker.

During the lesson, the young people were asked to complete a diary schedule of the activities they engaged in outside of school hours during the last week. They were encouraged to include everything. See Appendix A for specimens of three completed diary schedules.

The diary returns of every type of activity were collated into a database. The activities were then categorised by area (school) and age group and into organised or not organised. A 'Not Organised' activity was if the young person stated they organised the activity themselves. The 'Not Organised' activities were further categorised into 'Staying In' or 'going Out'. 'Staying In' incorporated activities such as watching the television, playing computer games, talking on MSN and completing homework. 'Going Out' included activities such as visiting the park and hanging out with friends. An 'Organised' activity was one organised by another person such as a coach or teacher or volunteer. These were further categorised into:

- **Sport** such as cricket, football, horse riding, karate
- **Cultural** such as dance, drama, singing and art.
- **Uniformed** such as scouts, guides, sea scouts.
- **Other** such as youth services through both statutory and voluntary support mechanisms.

All days left blank were originally entered as unknown although it is not certain whether they were left blank, due to lack of time, whether the person perceived the activity they were doing as irrelevant or it was information they were unprepared to share. A strong assumption would be that they were left blank because the young person did 'nothing' on these occasions. A calculated assumption would add them to the 'staying in' category. The 'staying in' category already was the highest recorded so this assumption significantly adds to it. The report presents those recorded as 'unknown' separate from the 'staying in' category but the conclusions make the assumption that young people 'stay in' when nothing was recorded.

### **2.2.2 Special needs schools**

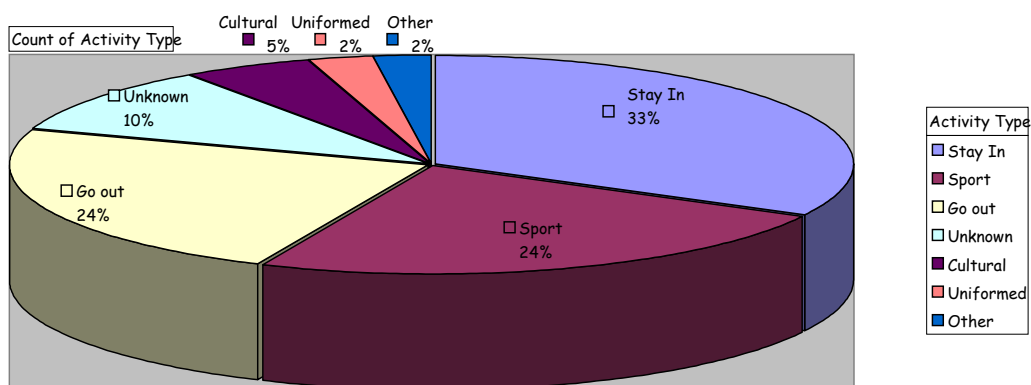
The two workers also visited the three Special Needs schools in Fareham; Baycroft, St Francis and Lord Wilson. Advice was taken about the style of session to deliver in these schools. In Baycroft the same sessions were delivered as the comprehensive schools but in St Francis and Lord Wilson it was adapted to meet the learning styles of the pupils. The data collected from Lord Wilson and St Francis provided an insight into the level of participation and integration for pupils from Special Needs schools but was not collected in the same way to integrate it into the data analysis.

## 2.3 The Findings

### 2.3.1 Overview of all activities

Every young person engaged in this survey had the opportunity to record their out of school activities for 7 days. The Overview of Activities diagram (i) below, represents 219 young people recording 7 activities during the week.

(i) Overview of activities



- Of all activities recorded for the whole week 33% were recorded as 'staying in' activities and 10% unknown which can be assumed to be staying in i.e. 43% staying in.
- 57% of activities, averaged throughout the week, were going out activities. This included 24% involved in sport and 24% going out to socialise (Meeting in social grouping areas such as parks and taking part in unsupervised activities)

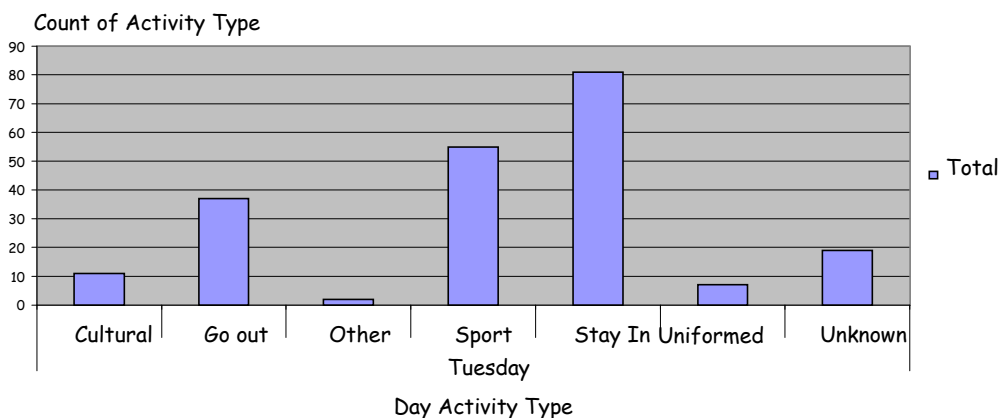
### 2.3.2 Comparisons between activities on different nights of the week

It was possible to compare the types of activities on different nights of the week. Diagram (ii) and (iii) compare Tuesday's activities with Friday's activities but reveal very little difference on week days. However, at the weekends very few young people recorded doing anything on Sundays, apart from playing football, suggesting that Sundays might still traditionally be regarded as a family day.

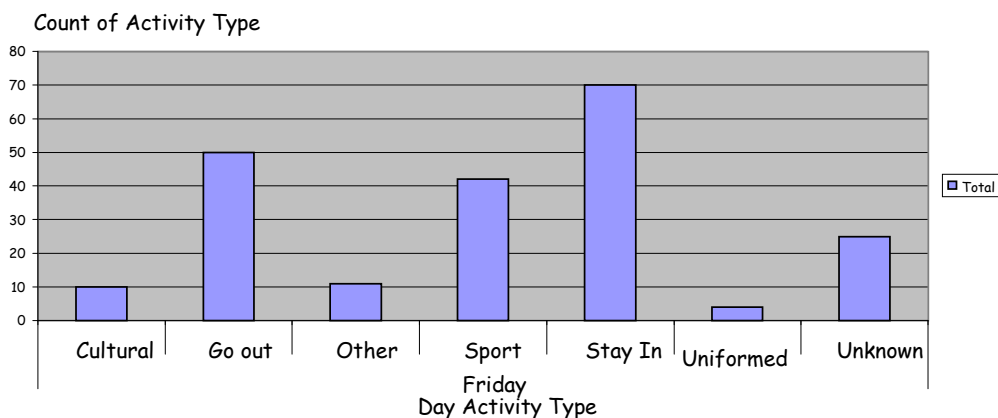
- The data revealed that young people either engage in a wide range of organised activities or engage in nothing apart from watching television, being on the computer, MSN and playing computer games. As an overview most activities that young people engage in on any one evening are not organised activities. Young people tend to either stay in or socialise outside with friends. On a Monday for example over half those who participated in the lessons stated that they stay in engaging in a range of self organised activities. On Tuesdays only 10 less young people stayed in than Fridays with a corresponding rise in young people

going out, however on both nights staying in was still the most popular activity.

**(ii) Tuesday activity chart**



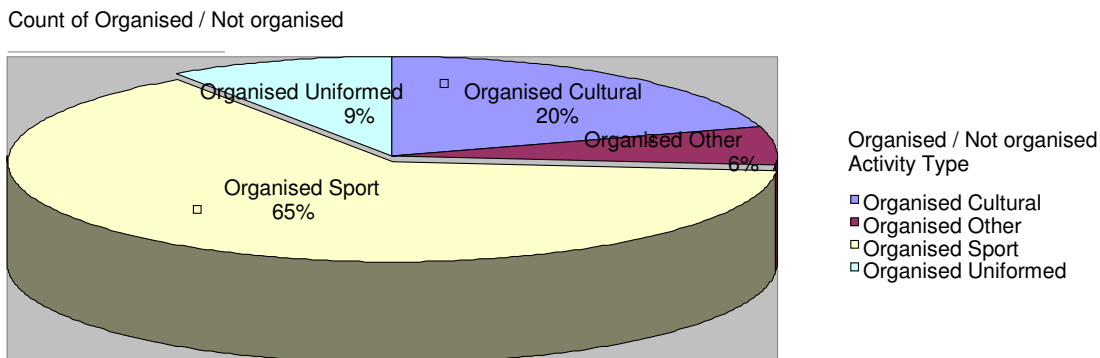
**(iii) Friday activity chart**



**2.3.3 Overview of organised activities**

A total of 33% of activities young people engaged in were regarded as 'organised'. The chart below shows how these were split between cultural, sport, uniformed and other.

**(iv) Overview of organised activities**



- 65% of organised activities were sport related. The most popular activity by far was football but others included Rugby, Cricket, Swimming and Tennis.

- 20% of organised activities were of a cultural nature with a fairly even split between activities such as Drama and Dance.
- 14% of organised activities were uniformed activities such as Scouts and Guides.

### 2.3.4 Frequency of organised activities:

Table (v) shows how many respondents participated in organised activities for how many nights of the week and compares this with the number of participants who did not participate in any organised activities at all. NB: The number of respondents in year 10 was very low, so too small to provide a valid sample.

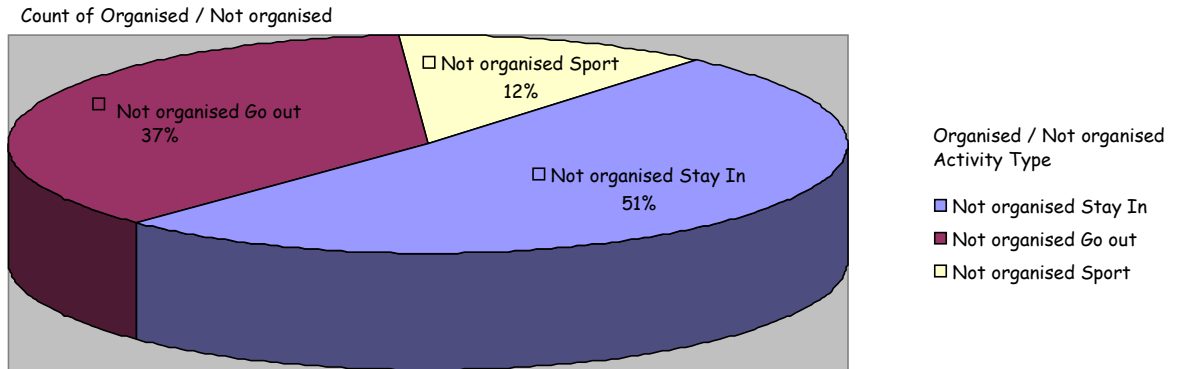

Table (v) also gives a breakdown of how often those who stated they engaged in organised activities actually participated. It shows that for example in year 7 (10/11 year olds) 85% of young people engaged in an organised activity at least one night a week. Not surprisingly very few young people engaged in organised activities 5, 6 or 7 times a week. Also as they get older, the number of young people participating in organised activities decreases so that by age 13/14 less than half engage in organised activities, confirming a commonly held view that as young people grow older they increasingly like to seek their own entertainment rather than be organised.

### 2.3.5 Overview of 'not organised' activities

A total of 67% of activities young people engaged in were deemed to be not organised. Diagram (vi) shows the split between, staying in, going out, sport, cultural and other.

(vi) Overview of not organised activities



- If no activity is organised this would suggest that on any one evening 51% of young people stay in after finishing school and 49% of young people socialise and / or take part in an not organised sport.
- Football was also the most popular sport that young people liked to organise themselves and so fell into the not organised category
- In the not organised category staying in and engaging in activities such as watching the television, playing computer games, talking on MSN, completing homework, were the most popular, with going out second. The going out category included statements such as visiting the park and hanging out with friends.

### 2.3.6 Geographical distribution

No distinct patterns emerged, with any areas showing a considerable difference in terms of the spread of activities. See Appendix B for breakdown of individual schools.

### 2.3.7 Anecdotal feedback from school sessions

Other feedback from the sessions gave the workers additional information.

- Overall young people tend to engage in organised activities within the Borough with a few travelling outside to Portsmouth and Southampton.
- Young people did travel to Gosport to the Holbrook Sports Centre for activities.
- From this survey very few young people recorded they visited the cinema or went bowling. These are likely to be regarded as one off activities rather than regular weekly activities.
- There was no information collected which suggested that transport links were a barrier to participation in activities but no specific questions were

asked regarding this. Parents appeared to support young people to access opportunities.

- There was evidence from the individual school data offered that young people were accessing extended learning opportunities.

When asked, young people made a variety of comments that there was not a lot to-do.

- Young people did criticise the price of some leisure activities especially the cinema and bowling which may account for why these activities did not appear much as an activity which young people engaged in.
- In individual conversations workers were able to identify issues that young people felt were a barrier to them accessing leisure activities. They were able to identify activities they felt would enhance their leisure time such as a safe park with no vandalism, drugs or alcohol; revision club; singing and karaoke bars for all ages. However these were anecdotal and were not fully explored with all young people who participated.

### 2.3.8 Comments made by young people:

*We want somewhere to go for free where we can just sit and chat with our mates without having to buy anything.*

Cams Year 8

*A place to hang out at and not get kicked out of, if adults get a pub we should get a place too (doesn't mean to sell alcohol, just a place to go if it rains, something to do)*

Crofton Year 9

*I was really good (at skating) but now no boots fit me and I can't afford new custom made boots.*

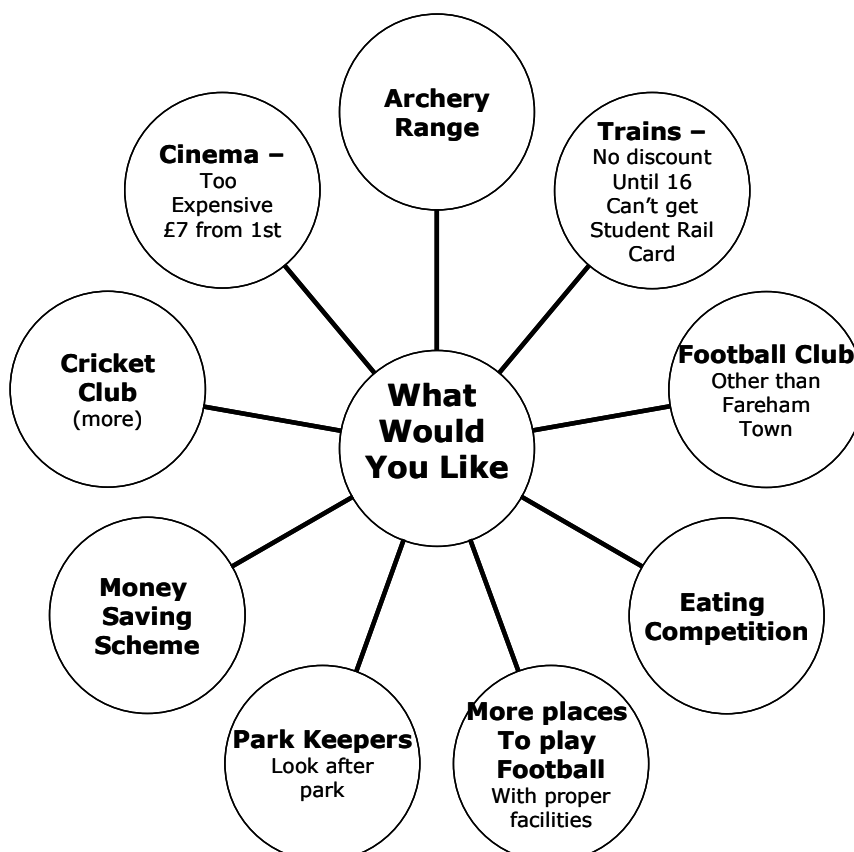
### 2.3.9 Feedback from young people with learning difficulties and disabilities

The pupils from Lord Wilson and St Francis were invited to talk about the activities they engaged in, their likes, dislikes, fears and needs rather than complete a written diary sheet. The three most popular activities were:

- Playing video games
- Talking on the computer (MSN)
- Playing football

In Appendix B which shows a breakdown of activities by school, the Baycroft returns (pupils with mild learning difficulties, who completed the diary returns) shows a much higher percentage of pupils engaging in 'Staying In' activities, 48%, than in any of the other comprehensive schools in the survey. The pupils in Lord Wilson and St Francis made similar statements in their discussions with the workers.

The diagram below shows the comments from one lesson of what these pupils said they would like to do.



In a discussion about what prevented them from participating in organised activities the list included:

- Cost

- Transport
- Exclusion on the basis of ability
- Things not being properly organised

This resulted in them tending to do more 'Staying In' Not Organised activities. They expressed views such as:

- Not feeling good enough to play for the local football team
- Not having the boots to go ice skating
- Not being allowed out on their own and having to go with parents

### **3. Part 2: What activities are available to young people in Fareham?**

**3.1.** The second part of the project involved searching Fareham to catalogue the range of organised activities that young people could engage in. The methodology involved searching through databases, gathering information by letter, phone, visit or internet plus any information gleaned from the returns by the young people participating in the lessons for part 1 of this project. Appendix C catalogues the findings by geographical area and days of the week. It shows what Fareham has on offer if young people choose to access, can afford the cost and are able to transport themselves. There is a wide range of activities from Morris dancing, flower arranging organised football to the cinema.

### **4. Conclusions**

- The project was intended as a snapshot of what young people in Fareham do and what is available to them. It is not a directory. It represents a snapshot during the winter/early spring of 2007 of a cross section sample of young people aged between 11 and 15. There is no comparison made with activities in the summer or activities during school holidays.
- It demonstrates that any generalisations about **all** young people hanging around the streets causing trouble or **all** young people sitting at home watching television or playing computer games would be untrue.
- However, on the whole young people in Fareham do engage more in 'not organised activities' which include both 'staying in' or 'going out to socialise'.
- If it is assumed that young people spend all their time indoors in sedentary pursuits then this survey dispels that assumption. The survey recorded that averaged across the week on any one evening 43% of young people stayed in (33% stated and 10% recorded as unknown, therefore assumed to be at home) compared to 57% who were out engaged in either an organised or an not organised activity. This needs to be understood. Very few young people would be 'out' every night. Equally, if a young person had a balanced programme for the week, for example Youth Club once a week, sports practice once a week, socialising with friends two nights a week and three nights staying in to watch TV, one could identify this as a well adjusted and active young person. This young person on some occasions would be identified in this survey as part of the 43% staying in and on other occasions as part

of the 57% going out either engaged in organised or not organised activities.

- The survey demonstrates that on any one night there are more young people participating in 'not organised' activities than 'organised'. The project did not ask the question about whether this was because there were not enough organised activities available to meet demand, i.e. is this reflecting what young people want or is it reflecting what is or is not available? Do market forces control the provision of organised activities?
- Young people attending schools in Fareham with Learning Difficulties and Disabilities feel more excluded from the organised provision of activities available to young people than their peers. They were less likely to participate in organised activities and participated more in 'Staying In' activities. Anecdotally they expressed a perception that organised activities were not always geared up to accept them.

The survey was a snapshot in time during winter and early spring in term time. It does not answer questions re quality of organised provision for young people. It does suggest that the majority of young people in Fareham want to go out and engage with other young people. Whether they engage in organised or not organised activities may depend on the quality of that provision, the availability of provision and identifying exactly what it is that will appeal to young people. This would be an interesting piece of work to continue if funding was available to identify some of the areas that have not yet been explored.

### **Activity 1**

The YP as a class will be asked to sit on the spectrum depending on if they spend most of their social time doing organised activities or un-organised activities. The YP will also be given examples through question and answer: Where would a YP that spends 5 nights at her dancing school sit? Where would a YP that spends his social time playing play station games sit?

Organised.....Non-organised

We will then ask YP to volunteer why they placed themselves in particular positions on the spectrum. The YP will then be introduced to the debate: What are the positive and negative aspects of both organised and un-organised activities?

The YP will be given themes and these will be allocated randomly. When cued the YP should introduce their new theme to stimulate further discussion on areas such as: money, flexibility, new skills, social aspect etc.

The YP will be de-briefed by being told this is useful in allowing them to reflect on what they do, why they do it, and if they are happy with the way they spend their time.

### **Activity 2**

The YP will be given a diary resource sheet and this will be used to record what they do each day with their spare time. These will all be collected at the end of this activity.

### **Activity 3**

The YP will be given a laminated A4 label to wear around their necks. The labels will vary between gay white male, deaf man, blind lady, old aged pensioner etc.

A statement will be read out and YP will move one step forward if they can access this. When all the statements have been read the YP will be asked to look around and observe the positions of other YP with their varying needs.

The YP will be asked how they felt as their assigned person.

### **Conclusion**

The YP will be thanked for their participation and will be informed in the future when the project is written up and all the information is collated. They will do a thumbs up, thumbs down activity to inform us if they liked the activities and if they were useful for their personal development. These will be recorded by Lara and Sarah to inform future planning.

### **Evaluation**

The results from the thumbs down, thumbs up activity will allow Lara and Sarah to amend the set lesson plan as the project moves forward. The results will be collated and presented in pie charts to allow us to identify the personal gain YP have achieved through doing this piece of work.

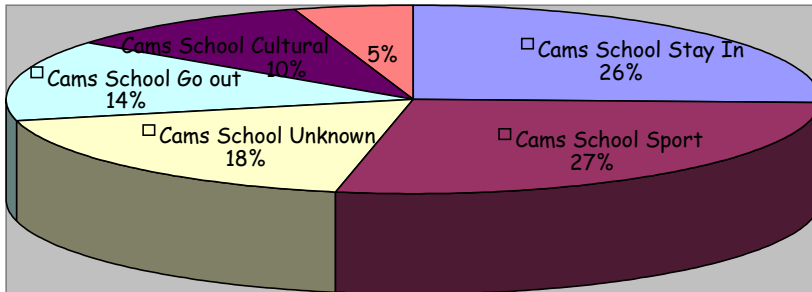

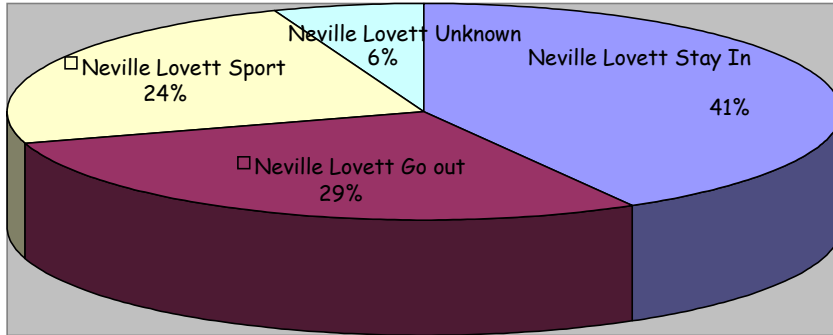

**SCRUTINY BOARD - SCOPING STUDIES****Opportunities for Young People in The Borough of Fareham**

***Councillors requesting item:*** Cllr Keeble – Chairman of Scrutiny Board

<b>Issue</b>	The Borough of Fareham, like most other district authorities, experiences problems with anti-social behaviour involving young people. Frequent reference is made to the perceived lack of opportunities for young people being a contributory factor. Various agencies provide services in the Borough of Fareham including Fareham Borough Council. However there is no one point of reference for these services and no one overall coordinating body. This situation results in fragmented communication of opportunities that young people and their parents find difficult to access.
<b>Background</b>	<p>Fareham Borough Council launched its original Youth Strategy in 2001. Towards the end of 2003, work commenced on reviewing the progress and impact that this strategy had made to the lives of young people locally. Following the review, the Council and other agencies developed a new action plan which was approved by the Executive on 7 March 2005. This action plan is valid until 31 March 2007 after which time the Youth Strategy will be superseded by the new Children and Young People's Plan currently being developed by Hampshire County Council in partnership with Fareham Borough Council and other agencies.</p> <p>For its part Fareham Borough Council has constructed five new neighbour facilities for young people at Portchester, Locks Heath, Stubbington, Whiteley and Park Lane.</p> <p>With the support of the Council, the Youth Council is also working towards its second Youth Conference which is planned for October 2007. Youth Council members have decided on a theme for the event "Stereotyping" and, subsequently, it was proposed that the Conference should try to forge a link with the Youth Strategy and the Fareham Children and Young People's Plan (CYPP) which will cover children and young people from 0-19 years of age. The local CYPP will feed directly into a Hampshire-wide CYP plan.</p> <p>As part of the work on the Local Development Framework a number of studies have been undertaken to inform the process and some of these studies have identified opportunities for young people. These include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Playing Pitch Study</li> <li>- Green Spaces Study</li> <li>- Indoor Sports Study</li> <li>- Community Infrastructure Study</li> <li>- Fareham Play Strategy</li> </ul>

<b>Objective &amp; Description</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. To establish the range and type of opportunities for young people aged 0 -19 in the Borough of Fareham.</li> <li>2. To undertake a gap analysis to identify shortfalls in the current provision of opportunities for young people in the borough.</li> <li>3. Consider the outcomes of the study and develop a strategy for the future provision of opportunities for young people.</li> </ol>

<b>Proposed Way Forward</b>	<p>The Fareham and Gosport Connexions Service and Fareham Youth Team (HCC Children’s Services) will conduct a study of young people across Fareham to establish the leisure opportunities available for them to access.</p> <p>There will be desk-top research into the other activities that are available to young people across the Borough. This information will be presented to the Council in the form of a “week in the life of a young person” alongside a database of activities by area.</p> <p>This data will inform all local youth agencies of the actual activities young people take up and where possible gaps in opportunities are. This can be communicated to young people and their families.</p> <p>The information will influence the Children and Young Persons Plan and help to focus resources for effective future provision.</p> <p>In order to keep the information relevant and up to date an approach will be made to Fareham Community Action with a view to them taking on this task.</p>
<p><i>How is the objective to be achieved? Options might include a report written by officers and considered by Scrutiny or Review Panels; informal working groups; discussion with external bodies; or a combination of several tools.
